THE PRINCIPAL POINT OF VIEW JAMES ANASTASIO, PRINCIPAL

With so much recent publicity about the gangs of young people and the related violence, or potential for violence, in the community, I thought it would be appropriate to share with you my concerns as they relate to the school.

- GANG –
- 1) A group of people who associate regularly on a social basis.
 - 2) A group of criminals or hoodlums who band together for protection or profit.

The above definitions appear consecutively as number one and two in my office dictionary. I'm sure there are many more sophisticated definitions, but for my purposes these will work fine. The vast majority of school-aged adolescents and young adults spent a significant part of each weekday in school; many attend the school in the evening and, for some, part of the weekends as well. It would be naive to believe that what goes on in the community doesn't affect school and, conversely, that what takes place at school doesn't impact the community. Although we haven't found weapons at CHRHS of the type described in recent press, it isn't too much of a stretch to acknowledge the possibility that students who carry weapons after school may in some circumstances have those same weapons in their cars while at school or, more frightening still, on their person while in school. I worry about this and think about the possibility of both more often than I would like to admit. If my concerns are valid, are there things that could be done to protect students, staff, and other building users who aren't current being done? There are a few things that could be done that would increase the perception of safety, but, in our modern world, safety is too elusive to guarantee.

The good news is that the "gangs" we deal with on a daily basis stem from definition #1. There are approximately fifty of them at CHRHS that support the curriculum, co-curricular and extra curricular activities in which student's band together to perform, compete, learn, and challenge themselves. Students who, with the help of parents, teachers, coaches, advisors, peers, churches, and communities, work together to do the right thing and to make a positive difference. Current and former students who "gang" together to intimidate, coerce, extort, steal, and break the law (definition #2) are a miniscule minority that in no way represent who we are and what we strive to be.

The collaborative and ongoing efforts of law enforcement, the communities, parents, students, and school personnel are essential as we work together to provide an optimal environment in which to grow physically, emotionally, psychologically, and intellectually. It is essential, if we are to succeed in minimizing the impact of a small group of lawbreaking adolescents and young adults on the school and community, that everyone recognize their role in this group effort and assume responsibility for their part.

We must have the courage to be positive, proactive role models for our youth and to continue to expect those with whom we interact to live up to reasonable standards based on respect for themselves and others.

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What is influenza (the flu)?

Influenza Viruses

Influenza, commonly called "the flu," is caused by the influenza virus, which infects the respiratory tract (nose, throat, lungs). Unlike many other viral respiratory infections, such as the common cold, the flu causes severe illness and life threatening complications in many people.

Influenza virus is transmitted from person to person primarily through the coughing, sneezing or talking of infected persons. It is perfectly reasonable to promote very basic respiratory hygiene and "cough etiquette" practices in the household and the community to reduce transmission. During December, the Bureau of Health is joining other states' health departments in a "Cover Your Cough and Clean Your Hands" campaign to promote prevention of respiratory viral infections including influenza. The basic messages are:

1. Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue, whenever you cough or sneeze. Then throw the tissue away.
2. If you don't have a tissue, cough or sneeze into your sleeve.
3. MOST IMPORTANTLY: clean your hands often - with soap and water, or with an alcohol based, waterless hand sanitizer.

What are the symptoms of the flu? Influenza is a respiratory illness. Symptoms of flu include fever, headache, extreme tiredness, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, and muscle aches. Children can have additional gastro-intestinal symptoms, such as nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea, but these symptoms are uncommon in adults. Although the term "stomach flu" is sometimes used to describe vomiting, nausea, or diarrhea, these illnesses are caused by certain other viruses, bacteria, or possibly parasites, and are rarely related to influenza.

Does the flu have complications? Yes. Some of the complications caused by flu include bacterial pneumonia, dehydration, and worsening of chronic medical conditions, such as congestive heart failure, asthma, or diabetes. Children may get sinus problems and ear infections as complications from the flu. Those aged 65 years and older and persons of any age with chronic medical conditions are at highest risk for serious complications of flu.

What type of flu season are we going to have in 2003-04? Current surveillance data indicate that the United States is experiencing an early influenza season that could be more severe than in the past 3 years. The situation underscores the need for timely immunization of those people most at risk from serious complications of influenza and the people taking care of them, especially health-care workers.

Will this year's flu vaccine protect me from the flu? Influenza viruses are changing all the time, and vaccine effectiveness depends, in part, on the match between vaccine strains and circulating viruses. Laboratory studies indicate that the vaccine should provide some cross protection against the circulating A (H3N2) strain.

Because flu viruses are already circulating in some communities, it's even more important to get the vaccine now. There is flu vaccine available, and it's especially important that those people who are recommended for vaccination get the vaccine this year. The influenza vaccine is safe and is the most effective way to prevent the disease and its complications

How soon will I get sick if I am exposed to the flu? The time from when a person is exposed to flu virus to when symptoms begin is about one to four days, with an average of about two days.

How long is a person with flu virus contagious? The period when an infected person is contagious depends on the age of the person. Adults may be contagious from one day prior to becoming sick and for three to seven days after they first develop symptoms. Some children may be contagious for longer than a week.

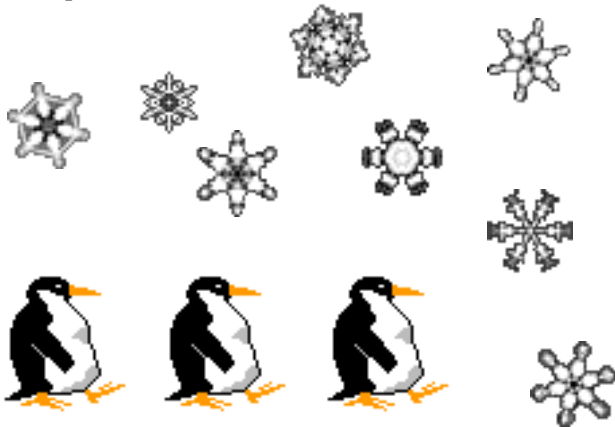

Parents/Guardians must always notify the administrative office the day their student is absent or tardy by calling ext. 262. Our phone system allows parents/guardians to make these phone calls 24 hours a day/seven days a week. Parents/guardians unable to make the phone call to the attendance office must give their child a note on the day he/she returns to school. These notes must be given to Ms. Marcotte no later than 7:40 am the day the student returns to school or the absence will be categorized as unexcused and a detention(s) will be assigned starting the next afternoon. For dismissals, the call or the note should be done at least one school day in advance, unless there is an emergency. It is the students' responsibility to obtain an attendance slip, prior to the start of school, from the administrative office the morning they return to school. If a student misses more than 40 minutes of a class, it is counted as a classroom absence.

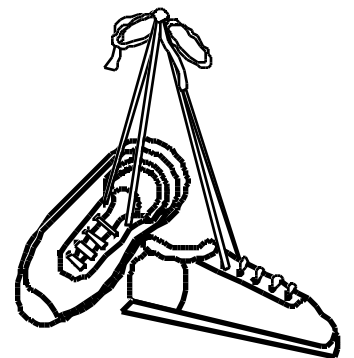
African American Dance Ensemble
